Lavenders include some 28 species of evergreen aromatic shrubs and sub shrubs belonging to the mint family, the Lamiaceae. They occur mainly around the Mediterranean and their flowers range from pink to purple and white.

Lavenders appreciate full sun. Grow them in shade and they grow out towards the sunlight, and they like a well-drained soil. They don't like wet feet. They don't need a lot of fertiliser but some dolomitic lime in spring and autumn helps, and add some potassium to intensify the colour and strengthen the stems.

These plants develop a good root system, so they don't need too much water. As lavender plants age, bushes can become woody. When pruning it's important to retain the green foliage and don't cut back into the old wood. (From ABC Gardening Australia)

October Speaker Review:

Last month Seila Hierk gave us a most comprehensive and informative talk on Beekeeping.

Did you know Australia is one of the top 10 honey producing countries of the world and of the 30,000 registered beekeepers in Australia most of them are backyard hives!

Honey is well known for its anti inflammatory and anti bacterial properties and is the only natural food that doesn't go off.

The main harvests of honey are made in December and March. Spring honey tends to have strong citrus flavours.

There are several pests that can attack hives – the wax moth, hive beetle and varroa mite to name a few. New South Wales beehives have had severe attacks from the varroa mites which wiped out the complete hive and destroy both bees and honey. The pests are a big problem for beehives as bees are the chief pollinators of all our food and our food supplies depend upon them

Seila also showed us the construction of the hives with the various frames and a beekeeper's equipment

The Right Preparation For Growing Tomatoes In Melbourne Begin your tomato growing odyssey by picking seedlings that are disease-resistant and plant them after all possibilities of frost has actually passed. Select an area that gets complete sunshine, proper drainage and protection from the wind. Make sure the soil is naturally rich before you dig – then remove the bottom leaves from your tomato seedlings and plant them in the soil so that it covers the gotten rid of leave's areas. Stake your tomato plants to reduce root damage and after that water thoroughly (without wetting the plant's leaves).

Now that your tomato seedlings are planted, you're ready to support them into healthy plants that will produce the very best tomatoes you have actually ever tasted. Here are some tomato growing tips that will assist you prevent the common issues of growing tomatoes:

Water regularly and early at the base of the tomato plants while they remain in their early stages (drip watering is a great way to ensure your tomato plants are getting enough, but not too much, water.

Periodically investigate your tomato plants for disease and prune those dead or dying leaves frequently.

Cabbage Moths and Grubs

Breeding. The females lay single eggs on the underside of host leaves. The eggs hatch into caterpillars after about four days and the caterpillars then eat for 17 days, before becoming pupae for eight days. They finally emerge as white butterflies.

Dipel is the safest spray to use OR squash the caterpillars by hand OR net the plants
