Our Annual General meeting is held every November. Annual subscriptions will also be due in that month. For the next couple of months, we will be discussing the Office holders' functions as well as the functions of the other Committee members.

In 1982 the Club Committee positions included the following: President, Vice President, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, two Committee members, Librarian and Newsletter Editor. 9 Committee members in total.

In 2023 we have 10 Committee members which are: President, Vice President (vacant), Secretary, Treasurer, Newsletter Editor, Fundraising Coordinator, Speakers Officer and 3 general positions.

Here are the details of what the top 3 positions entail:

President

- Face of Club spokesperson and representative of Club at Local Council meetings, other groups and events as necessary
- Networking attract new members
- Plan annual agenda hospitality and friendship
 - New initiatives
- Chair monthly meetings
- Ensure rules and policies are followed
- Answer numerous phone calls and emails from members
- Drafting policy in response to members' wishes
 - Ensure that issues are followed through
 - Coordinate passing information to other members
 - Approve delegation of activities
- Delegate to Vice President and /or Secretary
 - Rosters kitchen and Judging
 - Organise updates to website

Secretary

- Prepares agendas for each Committee meeting and Annual General Meeting
 - Records Minutes of Committee Meetings
- Receives and records apologies from members non attendance at meetings
- Receives and disseminates correspondence
- Issues notice to all members for the election of Committee members in previous newsletter (AGM)
- Associated legal obligations to Government bodies – Consumer Affairs
 - Maintains archives
- Membership maintains a register of member's names and addresses (and other details)

keeps an up to date register

sends a formal letter of
acceptance to all new
member

Treasurer

- Controls the Club's finances by promptly depositing all funds within 2 business working days and by paying all approved expenses using electronic banking, as appropriate
- Submits financial report to the monthly meeting summarising movement in bank account – expenses and total income
- Prepares the annual budget in conjunction with the Committee and recommends the quantum of annual subscriptions and joining fees
- Finalises the annual accounts and arranges for audit
- Works in conjunction with the Secretary on membership applications and payment of fees
- Monitors collection of fees for Club activities to ensure all are received and any valid overpayments are returned
 - Protects organisation against fraud, theft
- Ensure safe custody of money including petty cash (no more than \$50 at a time)

Starting at 7:15pm:

The mugs, teapots coffee, etc are in the cupboard in the ladies wash room. Ray or Pauline unlock it and our things are taken to the kitchen, mugs on the bench, Tea in pots, Urn filled and turned ON low.

Some foods put in fridge ie if it has cream or perishables ie sandwich fillings, We have our own tea towels.

Food to be warmed goes in the pie warmer perhaps 45min before end of raffle, Help serve hot drinks Afterwards collect mugs, etc

Wipe out pie warmer, Wash, dry, clean benches & floor Urn to be OFF and Pack everything back into cupboard. Someone takes tea towels home to wash and returns them the next month. Pauline is always happy to do this too.

The Spice To Put In Your Soil While Rooting New Plants
