Hello Gardeners All,

At this point of writing (27/4) I have had 14mm rain this week. It is so timely as we all have had extra dry gardens. However, the nearly dead bean plants have still been producing through the warm weather. It has been a bumper crop with lots in the freezer.

The one large clump of Jerusalem Artichokes were dug today and have had their first wash of many to clean the soil out of grooves. When clean, they will be fermented then refrigerated. We have found this eliminates the issue of excess abdominal gas.

Bought seedlings of peas, cabbage, thyme are in as are my saved garlic, and shallots and seedlings of broccoli and cauliflower. Radish and carrot seeds are up and Coles Dwarf Broadbeans are planted. I will report on the result in late spring as they need 18deg for flowers to set then grow broadbeans.

Ten days ago the contents of a full bokashi bucket were buried in a trench, covered with soil and today the broadbeans were planted in that area with only a sprinkle of rockdust as I'm hoping the decomposed fermented vegetable waste does the fertilising.

Enclosed are some photos from the garden: yacon/Peruvian Apple, related to dahlias, just flowering; last of the dark pink dwarf snapdragon; pineapple sage in flower; seed pods of rat-tailed radish- when just set, use in stir fry.

Planting in May

May is an ideal month for planting winter vegies in well prepared beds. Continue to water well through any dry spells and install dripline for brassica family vegies and garlic.

Plant seeds in punnets

broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, Florence fennel, kale, kohlrabi, leek, lettuce, onion family excluding garlic, silverbeet, spinach

Plant seedlings into soil

American upland cress between plants of broccoli, cabbage and cauliflower (this is a dead end trap plant that protects these plants from white cabbage butterfly, the eggs of which develop into green caterpillars); broccoli, cabbage and cauliflower, Florence fennel, kale, kohlrabi, leek, lettuce, rocket, other salad greens, silverbeet, spinach

Plant seeds direct into the soil

Asian greens, broad beans, carrot, daikon, mustard greens, parsnip, peas, radish, rocket, turnip and herbs including coriander, chervil and dill

Plant garlic direct into the soil

Plant seedlings every few weeks so that they will not all be ready for harvest at the same time.

Watering

Water soil (not leaves) deeply at least twice per week. (Rainfall less than 10mm per day does not count). Install dripline if possible.

Raspberry Cake

This is a recipe from Anita's collection.

She has made this cake for Club meetings, members have requested her for the recipe Ingredients:

1 1/2 cups (170g) almond meal

1 1/4 cups (275 g) castor sugar

3/4 cup (70 g) desiccated coconut

4 eggs

2 tsp vanilla extract

200g butter, melted and cooled (or Nuttlex for dairy free)

3/4 cup (70g) raspberries

Preheat oven to 180dec C, lightly grease a 24cm springfoam pan and line base with baking paper.

In a large bowl, stir together almond meal, sugar and coconut

In a medium bowl whisk the eggs and vanilla extract until combined

Add the melted butter and mix well.

Add the butter mixture into the dry ingredients and mix until smooth

Pour batter intio the prepared pan, and dot the top with the rasberries

Bake 50-55 minutes until cake is golden and top springs back.

Cool in pan for 5 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely


