Committee Members 2025 At the May Club meeting Avril Clark took us on a tour of Monet's iconic garden in Giverny, France. We travelled back to the 19th century when Monet first rented the Pink house to accommodate his large combined family in the middle of the rich apple growing region of Normandy. Initially Monet installed vegetable gardens to feed the family but several years later he was able to purchase the property and begin gardening in earnest. Heavily influenced by the Japanese woodblock art and his love of

> colour he experimented with unusual combinations with a wide variety of plants. Many years later he designed and installed the Water Garden across the road, which is now reached by an underground tunnel. The water garden is designed along the Japenese concept of a "cup garden" which allows for introspection, serenity and peace. It is covered in beautiful water lilies and around the edges are lush plantings of Mollis azaleas, Japense maples, Wisteria, Weeping Willows etc.

Such a beautiful garden for generations to enjoy.





### Hello Gardeners All,

The weather has become chilly belatedly but we are still too dry. I had 18.7mm for May which is so inadequate. Keep up watering seeds, seedlings, larger vegetables and many shrubs.

The oregon pea seedlings planted at Easter are flowering, and the savoy cabbages and golden beetroot appear to be doing ok. My seedlings of broccoli, cabbage, cos lettuce, rocket and cauliflower were planted late May. It is almost the last date for successful planting with the much colder weather due but one can potentially try till mid June. I also have broad beans up about 100mm.

Bought seedlings of peas, cabbage, thyme are in as are my saved garlic, and shallots and seedlings of broccoli and cauliflower. Radish and carrot seeds are up and Coles Dwarf Broadbeans are planted. I will report on the result in late spring as they need 18deg for flowers to set then grow broadbeans.

There are white fly and aphids attacking all brasicas and I have been liquid feeding them in the hope that improving their strength will fight the pests off. The recent rain, as small as it was seems to have helped also. The asparagus is dying back and in a couple of weeks they will be cut to the ground to wait for the spring shoots. The silverbeet is prolific.

Some of the roses too have put on a late spring burst of beautiful flowers, especially Sonata. The white alisum is still flowering and the snapdragons have almost finished. Interestingly, the dark pink is the last one to finish with flowers as the cream, yellow and pale pinks are all long gone. In spring their dropped seeds will self grow and I will transplant some.

### Things to do in the garden this Month:

Plant deciduous trees, shrubs, vines, cane fruits and roses.

Wait till spring to plant citrus.

Divide existing perennials and plant new perennials.

Gather and compost fallen leaves.

Protect plants that are not frost-hardy in frost-prone areas.

Install windbreaks, such as the plastic tree guard sleeves, around evergreens.

Prune deciduous fruit trees (not apricots, best to prune these in late autumn when the leaves start yellowing, during dry, preferably windy weather to prevent diseases entering the pruning cuts).

Prune deciduous shrubs (rose pruning is done in July) and vines (such as kiwi fruit).

Prune grape vines and take hardwood cuttings from these for propagation.

Continue planting garlic, strawberry runners and shallot bulbs.

Harvest parsnips, they will taste better now that they have experienced some cold.

### **Competition Table Tips**

Here are some tips for members who will like to bring in plants for us to admire

The plant and flowers should be at their best and make sure you have watered the plant so it looks healthy. Cut out any dried leaves or stems.

If you have placed the plant in a container make sure that the size of the container is just right as that affects the appearance of the plant. Also give the container a good clean so that the plant looks at its best.

If you are displaying any flowers, put them in a vase that will enhance thdir beauty, place the large blooms at the back and the smaller blooms in the front.

Please bring in fruits as well for us to admire and taste.


